Board of Finance Minutes Feb. 17, 2021 Monthly Meeting

Present: Jim Blackketter, Rufus de Rham, Ed Epstein, Tegan Gawel, Fran Goodsell, Nancy O'Dea-Wyrick.

Public and Invited Guests: Emily Basham, Debbie Devaux, Mackey Dykes, Donna Hayes, Martin Lindenmayer, Wendy Murphy, Dana Slaughter, Jean Speck, Mathew Starr.

Board chairman Nancy O'Dea-Wyrick called the meeting to order via Zoom at 6:12 p.m.

A quorum was present, and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Approval of Agenda: Mr. Blackketter made a motion to approve the agenda as submitted. Mr. Epstein seconded the motion, and the motion was approved unanimously.

Approval of Minutes 1/20/2021: Mr. Blackketter made a motion to approve the minutes of the Jan. 20, 2021 monthly meeting. Mrs. Gawel seconded the motion, and the motion was approved unanimously.

Correspondence: The board clerk shared with the board the Chore Services' letter which should be part of the Annual Town Report (attached).

Reports: Tax Collector: Debbie Devaux provided a written report (attached). Ms. Devaux said the pie charts in the report are interchangeable from last fiscal year to this year, adding "we are doing well." She noted that there is \$15,000 in back due taxes, which she said is not a big cushion.

Board of Education: Marty Lindenmayer report budget season is going well, and Kent Center and the region should meet the March date that the Finance Board asked for these reports. Mr. Lindenmayer expressed appreciation for the vote and approval of the KCS entryway project. The project will include upgrading the cameras and security around the school.

Mr. Lindenmayer said he wants to discuss with the board the Greenbank Solar Project that the Conservation Commission is sponsoring. Mr. Lindenmayer said KCS is the only building in Town that could be solar. He introduced Mackey Dykes and Emily Basham They made the following points:

- O The project would create at least a 10% discount.
- O CT Green Bank owns your system.
- O You would be locking into a fixed, 20-year rate.
- O Green Bank is responsible for operation and maintenance.
- O The school would be able to store the solar energy when the school doesn't need it and then would be able to pull down those credits.
- O Mr. Lindenmayer noted Sharon Center School also is looking at this solar project.
- O School board member Dana Slaughter said the school board would like to sign the letter of intent in March or April. Mr. Lindenmayer said the school board has looked at it and would

like to get the Finance Board's consent to sign the letter.

Board of Selectman: Jean Speck reported:

- O Ten pistol permits were issued in January.
- O The free weekly COVID testing in Kent continues. She recognized the CERT team members, the highway foreman and those administering the tests who are standing outside for four hours in the cold. Kent is averaging 200-300 tests each week.
- O The first selectman asked for a moment of silence for Town employee John Lindsay, who passed away February 8. A moment of silence was observed.
- O The vaccine roll-out continues to be a challenge. The CERT volunteers were making phone calls to over 300 Kent residents to be sure they are aware of the vaccination clinic in Kent. High Watch vaccinated some homebound residents in their homes. Leah Pullaro did a great job getting the word out through a newsletter.
- O Council of Governments executive director Rick Lynn announced his retirement, effective at the end of this fiscal year.
- O The Northwest Corner Prevention Network is working on a vaping campaign.
- O The Town's legal team continues to monitor the Schaghticoke lawsuit
- O The selectmen passed the Sustainable CT which will create a more sustainable town and makes the Town a more desirable place to live.
- O The glass container is being built for use at the transfer station. The glass will be hauled away to be recycled and reused. The Town still is working on an organics program, which could reduce the Town's municipal solid waste costs because the Town pays by weight. Mr. de Rham said he is a big fan of Sustainable CT. Ms. Speck said right now there isn't any plan to recycle plastic bags, noting there is a lot of contamination with the plastic bags.
- O The Town will be working on a broadband initiative.

Treasurer: Barbara Herbst provided a written report to the board before the meeting (attached). She said the Town may receive FEMA funds for damages from last summer's storm.

FY2022 Budget Calendar Review: The board has set special budget meetings for March 24 and April 7, if needed.

FY2022 Capital Plan: Mr. Blackketter said he doesn't have any serious questions about the proposed plan. Mr. de Rham said the selectmen seem to have taken the board's concerns, commenting that the fire department requests look better and cleaner. Mr. de Rham added that he would like the finance board to discuss the Annual Town Report at a future date and reconsider what the board is using the report for. He also would like to see all the school reports together. Ms. O'Dea-Wyrick said the Board of Finance oversees the report. She added that the board could review what purpose it wants to report to serve. One major battle has been getting reports from people, she added. Ms. O'Dea-Wyrick said she sent a copy of the Five-Year Capital Plan to the Planning and Zoning Commission. Land Use Administrator Donna Hayes said the copy of the plan that she received has the wrong date. Mrs. Herbst will send Mrs. Hayes the correct copy.

Ms. Speck asked if there are any areas of focus or mission or goals regarding the budget? Ms.

O'Dea-Wyrick said the mission would be not to raise the mill rate. Mr. Epstein commented, "we are not going to raise the mill rate." Mr. Blackketter and Ms. Gawel voiced agreement.

Public and Invited Guests: Kent resident Matt Starr shared his concerns about flooding of properties along Botsford Road despite the water bars that the Town has installed. Mr. Starr said he asked to have drainage work done and didn't ask for paving. He added that former first selectman Bruce Adams assured him the Town would find the money to do it. Mr. Starr asked that the Board of Finance look at the project, saying it really should be done sooner rather than later. Ms. Speck said the selectmen talked about the project at its last meeting. The project is in the capital plan and needs to continue to move through the plan. Ms. O'Dea-Wyrick said the board has heard Mr. Starr's concerns. Mr. Starr thanked the board for its time.

Mr. de Rham made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 7:32 p.m.

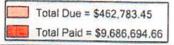

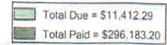

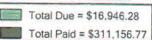

Chore Service - Kent Town Report 2020

The Chore Service, founded in 1992, provides non-medical help at home such as cleaning, running errands, yard work, etc., for clients in Canaan, Cornwall, Falls Village, Kent, Norfolk, Salisbury/Lakeville and Sharon. Clients contribute only what they can (if they can) toward the service, and Chore Workers are paid \$14.00 per hour for their time. Fundraising, grants, and town contributions make up the difference between what clients can contribute and the cost of providing services.

From July, 2019 through June, 2020, The Chore Service provided over 500 hours of services to twenty-three Kent residents. These 23 residents received help with cleaning, errands, and yard work so that they could continue to remain safely in their homes. Two Chore employees who live in Kent earned over \$1,500 last year. Our federal grant monies that subsidizes services for those age 60 and over is always depleted before the year ends, so we are delighted that the Town of Kent continues to contribute to these services.

Here is what a few clients in Kent had to say about Chore Service:

"She is kind, caring, respectful, honest and always on time. How wonderful to have such a special person available to help me."

"I had breast cancer surgery in the summer and a hip replacement in the fall. Thank God for her."

"Prompt – good driver – good companion – Intelligent, good shopper. I have no complaints or criticisms – For Heaven's sake keep her!"

"I am not sure I could do without this steady, competent person every week."

"She has been a wonderful help to me."

As we face more requests for assistance and we fear more cuts in our federal funding, we are most grateful for the support of our donors, including the Town of Kent, for your generosity.

Solar MAP Program Notes



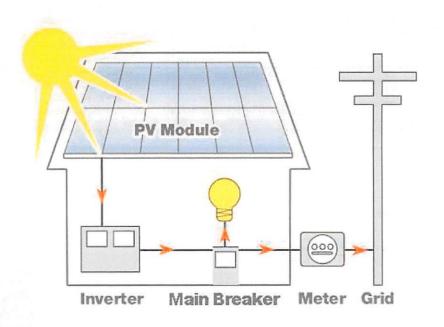
- Geared towards municipalities who lack the resources for solar procurement internally and would require technical assistance to put solar on municipal sites.
- Behind-the-Meter Solar PV projects only for Solar MAP
- Municipalities must have a 1-on-1 meeting with municipal representatives by February 1st 2021 to participate in this year's solar procurement.

Solar PV systems use net metering



Solar PV systems are located **behind the meter**, meaning electricity is intended for onsite use

Net metering is a billing mechanism allowing electricity in excess of customer usage to be banked at the full retail rate and credited on an annual basis



- At year end, excess electricity generation for the year is reimbursed at wholesale rate
- Wholesale rate generally much lower than retail electricity tariff
