Conservation Commission Regular Meeting Minutes Wednesday, October 11, 2023 @ 7:00pm

Call to order

- 1. A quorum being present, Commission Chair Connie Manes called the meeting to order at 7:04 pm.
- 2. Accept/Amend Agenda. Upon a motion by Melissa Cherniske seconded by Carol Franken, the Commissioners voted unanimously to accept the agenda.
- 3. Accept/Amend Minutes of Regular Meeting September 13, 2023. The minutes were amended to correct line 2 under item 7B. that Bruce Bennett is working with Rick Osborne to identify trees **throughout the town** that may need to be removed for safety and other reasons (e.g., dead ash and trees irreversibly damaged by spongy moth). *Upon a motion by Melissa seconded by Carol the Commissioners voted unanimously to accept the minutes with this amendment.*
- 4. Accept/Amend Minutes of Special Meeting September 28, 2023. The minutes were amended to correct item 4A. to reflect that the trees were proposed to be planted on Bridge Street, and that Bruce said the Town Crew had volunteered to do the watering. Upon a motion by Melissa seconded by Carol the Commissioners voted unanimously to accept the minutes with these amendments.
- 5. Treasurer's Report. None.
- 6. Public Comment. None.
- 7. Old Business. Discussion items
 - A. Purchase of Street Trees. Connie referred to the materials forwarded prior to the meeting including Jos and Bruce Bennett's proposal delivered and discussed at the last two meetings, records from Liddy showing the process and parameters used by the Commission in its past tree planting initiatives, examples from other Connecticut towns that have town-sponsored tree planting programs, and an email from Bruce to Jos.

These are draft minutes. Corrections may be made by the Committee at a subsequent meeting. Please refer to subsequent meeting minutes for possible corrections and approval of these minutes.

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www.townofkentct.org Jos reported that the proposed site for tree planting was on private property. The Commissioners discussed issues of fairness if the trees and planting costs were provided to the private owners free of charge when earlier the Commission had required private owners to contribute 50% of the cost. Commissioners further discussed the benefits of gaining the engagement and commitment of private owners by requiring their written agreement to maintain the trees, as had been done in the past and was a customary part of other towns' programs.

The Commissioners discussed the desirability of having neighbors come together around a plan for their street's trees. There was interest in creating a plan for the Village, perhaps as an outgrowth of Bruce's catalog of the town's trees. The Commission will continue to develop its street trees program in the November meeting, which Bruce will attend. The Commissioners discussed the Kuga Fund and its possible uses; the prevailing opinion is that the street trees program should not spend down all the assets in the fund but take a more incremental approach.

Wendy made a motion to ask the private owners to contribute 50% of the cost of the tree planting and sign an agreement using the form the Commission has used in the past, and if the owners are willing to do this, to go ahead with the tree planting as proposed. Carol seconded the motion. There were equal votes for and against, and the motion failed.

B. Report on Farmer Protection Ordinance Revisions. The Board of Selectmen meeting wherein the revised ordinance was to have been discussed was cancelled. The revisions are on the agenda for tomorrow night's Planning and Zoning Commission meeting.

Chapter 6: Conservation Commission

Section 5.2: Protection of Farms and Farmers from Nuisance Claims

1. **Purpose and Intent**. Agriculture is a significant part of the Town of Kent's heritage, its rural character, and may constitute a vital part of the Town's future. It is therefore the declared policy of the Town of Kent and legislative determination of the Kent Board of Selectmen to conserve and protect agricultural land and to encourage agricultural operations and the sale of local farm products within the Town. It is the purpose and intent of this ordinance to promote and advance the Town's policy and reduce the loss of local agricultural resources by limiting circumstances under which any such operation may be considered a nuisance. It is hereby further legislatively determined that whatever impact may be caused to others through normal agricultural practices, such impact is offset and ameliorated by the benefits of farming to the neighborhood, community, and society in general. Methods of farming that comport with generally accepted farming practices are also deemed to comport with community standards at large.

This ordinance is enacted for the protection of farms and farmers. It is not the purpose of this ordinance to create an avenue for complaints to be made against farmers which could not be made against non-farmers. It is protective, not punitive, in its application. It does not provide a process for and may not be used as an affirmative right to bring nuisance claims or grievances including but not limited to those related to noise, odors, dust or fumes, the storage or use of buildings and equipment.

This ordinance aligns with statewide policy codified in Connecticut General Statutes Section 19a-341, as may be from time to time amended. This ordinance is not to be construed as modifying or abridging state law relative to the abatement of nuisances, nor shall it supersede applicable health, safety, fire, life safety or building codes and regulations operable statewide or within the municipality of Kent.

2. **Declaration.** No present or future Agricultural Operations conducted or maintained in a manner consistent with accepted customs and standards of the agricultural industry, on a recognized farm which is engaged in the aet of farmingAgriculture and Agricultural Operations as defined in this ordinance, shall become or be considered a nuisance solelybecause such activity resulted or results in any changed condition of the use of adjacent land. Agricultural Operations may occur on holidays, weekends and weekdays by night or day, provided such activities do not violate applicable health, safety, fire, life safety or building codes and regulations.

It is herein understood that such Agricultural Operations may result in, for example but without limitation:

- a) The incidental noise from livestock or farm equipment;
- b) Odors from livestock, manure, fertilizer, compost, agricultural end-products, or feed;
- c) Dust and fumes created during plowing or cultivation operations
- d) The use of agricultural chemicals, pesticides and fertilizers including manure, provided such chemicals and the method of their application conform to practices approved by the Commissioner of the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, or, where applicable, Commissioner of Health Services;and
- e) Irrigation and water management associated with normally accepted farming practices.

3. **Definitions**. "Agriculture" means cultivation of the soil, dairying, forestry, raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity, including the raising, shearing, feeding, caring

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for, training and management of livestock, including horses, bees, poultry, fur bearing animals and wildlife, and the raising or harvesting of oysters, clams, mussels, other molluscan shellfish or fish; the operation, management, conservation, improvement or maintenance of a farm and its buildings, tools and equipment, or salvaging timber or cleared land of brush or other debris left by a storm, as an incident to such farming operations; the production or harvesting of maple syrup or maple sugar, or any agricultural commodity, including lumber, as an incident toordinary farming operations or the harvesting of mushrooms, the hatching of poultry, or the construction, operation or maintenance of ditches, canals, reservoirs or waterways used exclusively for farming purposes; handling, planting, drying, packing, packaging, processing, freezing, grading, storing or delivering to storage orto market, or to a carrier for transportation to market, or for direct sale any agricultural or horticultural commodity as an incident to ordinary farming operations, or, in the case of fruits and vegetables, as an incident to the preparation of such fruits or vegetables for market or for direct sale.

"Agricultural Operations" means activities relating to agricultural use including, but not limited to, thecultivation and tillage of soil, the burning, processing, or composting of agricultural waste products or other agricultural burning, processing or composting, provided that such composting activity shall not be the sole or primary agricultural operation, protection of crops and livestock from insects, diseases, birds, predators or other pests from damaging or potentially damaging crops, the proper and lawful use of agricultural chemicals including but not limited to the application of pesticides and fertilizers, or the raising, production, irrigation, pruning, harvesting, or processing of an agricultural commodity, including any type of crop or livestock, and anyforestry improvements and timber harvesting and processing. Such operations also include the operation and transportation of farm equipment over roads within the Town and conducting agriculture-related educational and farm-based recreational activities, including agritourism, provided the activities are related to marketing the agricultural output or services of the farm and local produce and livestock products and provided same do not conflict with any provisions of the zoning regulations. For purposes of this ordinance, such operations do not include the slaughtering of animals not raised on the premises where they are to be slaughtered.

"Farm" means land used primarily for agricultural activities including: agriculture, nurseries, orchards, ranges, forestry, nursery or truck gardening, or for raising or keeping of livestock and fowl but excluding the raising of animals for laboratory use or for their fur, farm buildings and accessory buildings thereto including barns, silos, greenhouses, hoop houses and other temporary structures or other structures, and as an incident to ordinary farming operations, the sale of agricultural or horticultural commodities.

"Locally" for the purposes of this ordinance shall mean all Connecticut counties as well as Dutchess, Columbia and Putnam Counties in New York; and Berkshire County in Massachusetts.

Good morning, Connie,

Bill and I are visiting family in South Carolina for the week but I saw the GTD article about tree placements and have a proposition/offer.

My brother, Hal, a Kent native and HVRHS graduate, recently died after a long struggle with Alzheimer's. His wife and I talked about planting a tree in his memory and because of my long involvement with Templeton Farm, I was in touch with administrator Brenda Crossley and Board president Tegan Gawel about planting a tree on the Templeton side of Swift Lane, which would eventually shade the street, new shuffleboard court there and the end of the middle building.

Luke Soule, whose two grandmothers lived at Templeton until their deaths, looked at the site with me and agreed it was an appropriate location. We talked about the possibility of a linden tree. As with past plantings of trees on the Templeton property (at least six or seven trees following major building improvements around 2006) we will take responsibility for watering, etc.

Brenda is willing to check out sewer and utility lines at the location. If this can be considered as one of your sites, our family is more than willing to pay at least half of the cost involved, which looks like it might be \$700 or thereabouts.
