COVID-19 Updates

COVID-19 numbers continue to decline. The state's average daily positivity rate is at 3.68% but we're keeping an eye on BA.2, a sub-variant of the highly infectious Omicron variant, which is now the dominant version of coronavirus in the United States. Mask requirements have, for the most part, been lifted. Residents are encouraged to keep an eye on community levels through the <u>CDC website</u> and wear a mask if recommended, including people with symptoms, a positive test, or exposure to someone with COVID-19.

Home test kits and masks are available to Kent residents at the Town Hall. Masks are in the front lobby and kits can be picked up in the First Selectman's Office. Please take advantage of drive-through testing at the Transfer Station and continue to stay smart when protecting your health and others.

Civic Engagement

Town of Kent Budget: The budget is now with the Board of Finance for their consideration. At the end of April, the treasurer will publish the proposed \$14 million town budget for the public to review ahead of the May 11th budget hearing.

Important dates for civic engagement in the Town Budget:

- **Wednesday, May 11:** Budget Hearing where residents have the opportunity to ask questions about the budget and learn about how their tax dollars are being spent.
- Friday, May 20: Town Meeting to vote to adopt the 2022-2023 municipal budget. Mark your calendars to attend!

2022 Legislative Session: The Connecticut General Assembly has begun what is referred to as a 'short session', running from February to May (even-numbered years are 'short sessions; odd-numbered years are 'long sessions,' running from January to June). Considering the short session, the legislature is considering a large number of bills. Here are a few I'm following:

HB-5044: AN ACT IMPLEMENTING THE GOVERNOR'S BUDGET RECOMMENDATIONS

REGARDING THE USE OF OPIOID LITIGATION PROCEEDS.

<u>HB-5116</u>: AN ACT REQUIRING THE CREATION OF UTILITY COMPANY TREE-PLANTING FUNDS.

<u>HB-5139</u> - AN ACT CONCERNING EXTENDED PRODUCER RESPONSIBILITY FOR TIRES.

<u>HB-5142</u>: AN ACT CONCERNING EXTENDED PRODUCER RESPONSIBILITY FOR CERTAIN GAS CYLINDERS.

<u>SB-88:</u> AN ACT CONCERNING AID IN DYING FOR TERMINALLY ILL PATIENTS. <u>SB-117:</u> AN ACT CONCERNING TREE REMOVAL ON PROPERTIES UNDER THE CONTROL OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY AND ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION. <u>SB-118:</u> AN ACT CONCERNING THE USE OF CERTAIN POLYSTYRENE PRODUCTS. <u>SB-168</u>: AN ACT ESTABLISHING A RIGHT TO HOUSING.

Town Updates

2022 Voter Canvass: The Registrars of Voters continue to conduct their annual voter canvass. Please read the <u>attached memo</u> regarding details.

Primary Care: Joanne Borduas from Community Health & Wellness Center presented to the Board of Selectmen at a recent meeting on their "B.E.T.T.Y." (Bringing Exceptional Treatment To You) unit which is equipped to provide a wide variety of services including medical screenings, lab tests and vaccinations, screening for social determinants of health, education, and referrals. Discussions continue about bringing this program, which will begin to address the lack of primary care in our community. to Kent in the near future,

Affordable Housing Plan: The steering committee has begun drafting the Town's municipal affordable housing plan which is due to State of Connecticut Office of Policy and Management this summer.

Birch Hill: There continues to be no updates regarding the proposed 85-bed substance use disorder treatment facility on the property at 46 Maple Street. The Town of Kent continues to monitor developments.



Federal Tribal Recognition: The Board of Selectmen met on Tuesday, March 29th to receive a report from special council on the status of the Schaghticoke Indian Tribe petition for federal acknowledgement. 

Streetscape: Thank you to everyone who filled out the *Town of Kent Sidewalk Materials Survey*. When the survey closed at midnight on March 31st, 726 people had responded. The results of the survey will be discussed at the regular meeting of the Board of Selectmen on Thursday, April 7th at 4:00p. NO MOW MAY: Leave the mower in the shed for an extra month! By leaving your property un-mowed for the month of May, you're helping to create habitat for pollinators and other wildlife. No Mow May is part of Pollinator Pathway, an initiative to create corridors of pesticide-free habitat and safe food sources for pollinating insects, birds, and other wildlife. The Board of Selectmen recently joined the Kent Conservation Commission, Kent Garden Club, Kent Land Trust, and Kent Sustainability Team in passing a Pollinator Pathway resolution.
